Anderson Creek Wildfire Affects Cattlemen, KCA There to Support

What is being considered as the largest wildfire in documented Kansas history, the Anderson Creek Wildfire swept quickly through Northern Oklahoma and into Kansas in late March, in what would leave nearly 400,000 acres burned and numerous resources depleted throughout the region.

The fire started on Tuesday, March 22 in Oklaho-

ma and spread north, and by Thursday, it had burned an estimated 397,420 acres across Kansas and Oklahoma.

In the wake of the fires in Barber County and surrounding areas, Kansas Cattlemen's Association (KCA) immediately began making and fielding calls of support for the ranchers affected by the devastating fires. In the following days, KCA worked to coordinate hay and other supply deliveries from as far away as Kentucky, as well as

receiving and distributing financial assistance from member donations.

"The outpouring of support from across the country for those affected by the fires has been incredible and a true testament of how, at the end of the day, we are here for each other. It became clear, early on, that securing and feeding the displaced livestock would be of highest priority. As the local emergency center was established and operational, KCA shifted focus from coordination to raising funds and pressing USDA and lawmakers to seek solutions," stated KCA Executive Director Tyler Dupy.

KCA in conjunction with Kansas Farmer's Union requested that the Risk Management Agency (RMA)

take immediate action on claims of loss due to freeze of wheat crops near the affected fire region in order to free up these lands for farmers and ranchers to efficiently and safely move livestock within the local region. KCA will continue to work with Senator Roberts, Senator Moran, and RMA Administrator Brandon Willis to find solutions to help ease the burden of displaced livestock.

Appropriations Rider to Block Final GIPSA Rules

The House Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture approved an amendment to the Agriculture and Rural Development Appropriations bill. The bill restricts the use of federal funds for publishing a final rule, providing clarification and change to the Grain Inspection, Packers and Stockyards Administration (GIPSA) rule. The Fiscal Year 2017 agriculture funding bill will now be sent to the Senate for debate and approval.

The 1921 Act regularly needs updates and clarifications in order to remain relevant with modern-day marketing practices. Legislators realized the need for changes in the 2008 Farm Bill, which required United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) to provide clarification and review of contracting and marketing practices in the livestock industry. As part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2016, congress finally passed funding for the final GIPSA rules. Now, an appropriations rider attached to the Rural Development Appropriations bill is set to, once again, block the funding of the implementation of a final GIPSA rules.

"The final GIPSA rule is long overdue. There is this notion that the beef industry marketplace is a self-regulating process, where no wrong is ever

March KCA News Delayed

The KCA News currently runs on a six-week production cycle. At times, production will be delayed a few days in order to include important legislative votes or to more quickly report events. The March KCA news went to production on-time, however suffered multiple setbacks getting delivered to you in a timely manner.

committed. First, it becomes all too easy to lump together beef production and beef processing into one large industry. Beef production is made up of hundreds of thousands of predominately independent cattle producers. Over 80% of beef processing is concentrated to four companies. The effect is four companies buying from a treasure trove of suppliers, with little transparency to the markets."

"With so much control concentrated to billion dollar corporate interests, independent producers essentially have to take on more risk and ante up additional resources just to maintain margins similar to operations comparable to 10 or 20 years ago. Conceptually, it is similar to peasant farms where those with too much power are doubling net profits over the course of a year, while producers double their investments and are more likely to come out even or a little negative," stated KCA Executive Director Tyler Dupy.

If taken up and passed by the Senate, the amendment, with the rider attached, will preempt GIPSA's authority to regulate a competitive marketplace. This allows for anti-competitive buying practices to continue on as usual, weakening free and fair market principles.

Suit filed in EPA WOTUS Case to be Heard by Panel

The waters of the U.S. rule, commonly called WO-TUS, was intended to clarify EPA and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers authority over areas around waterways where the federal government has authority to either require a federal permit or stop any activity that would disturb the waterway.

The rule gives the regulatory agencies broad authority over basic farming practices simply because water may pool somewhere after a rain or fill a ditch. Debate over the rules continues in many arenas. Legislation was passed earlier this year that required EPA and the Army Corp of Engineers to go back and draft a new version, however President Barack Obama vetoed legislation.

Most recently, a vote that would have prevented the agencies from implementing the rule received 56 votes, but the bill failed to muster the 60 votes needed to get into legislation.

There has been disagreement about which court has jurisdiction in the various cases filed at both the district and appeals court levels. It is this ongoing conflict between the district and appeals courts that has agriculture interest groups concerned that any court decision on the legal merits at some point could be overturned.

- 1 Beef Roast 3-4 lb
- 2 T Worcestershire
- 1 t Powdered Garlic
- 1 t Paprika
- 1 Onion Chopped
- 3 Carrots peeled and halved
- 4 Potatoes peeled and halved.

Gravy

- 3 T Flour
- 2 C Beef Broth

Roast Beef with Pan Gravy


Instructions:

Adjust the rack to the bottom of the oven and heat to 425 degrees. Blot any excess moisture from the roast, rub the Worcestershire sauce over the entire roast, and allow to marinate for 30 minutes, turning it twice.

Combine the powdered garlic, paprika, and pepper in a small bowl; sprinkle the seasoning mixture evenly over the roast, pressing it, and let the roast stand for 20 to 30 minutes. Rub the meat with 2 teaspoons salt, place fat side up in a shallow roasting pan, and roast for 15 minutes.

Reduce oven temperature to 325 degrees, add veggies, and continue to roast until the meat's internal temperature reaches 140 degrees F -- about 2 hours. Let the roast stand for 20 minutes before slicing.

Prepare the Gravy: Skim any fat from the liquid that remains in the roasting pan. Whisk the flour and 1/2 cup water together to a paste; set aside. Scrape the drippings from the bottom of the roasting pan, add the beef broth, and stir over medium heat until the mixture begins to simmer. While continuously whisking, add the flour paste and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to medium-low and let simmer for 4 to 5 minutes. If needed, add a little water to thin the gravy. Add salt and pepper to taste.



This devastating fire made national news, but the real headlines should have been the overwhelming generosity, from our rural small-town communities, to help our neighbors.


After the sale, Jay Gates made the comment that he had never been so proud to be part of it. This money wasn't raised by large outside corporations, but by our local and
