KCA Hosts County Meeting in Corning, Kansas Members of the Kansas Cattlemen's rate from scours prior to weaning, "KCA is prepared to provide testimony

Association (KCA) met in Corning, Kansas to discuss industry topics on the evening of March 19, 2015 at the Corning Community Center. The free event was open to the public, and it included a free USA Beef supper. ImmuCell provided a calf welfare presentation, and KCA provided updates regarding current legislation and other issues facing independent cattle producers. The meeting wrapped up with a presentation on the Beef Checkoff followed by an auction of

a Triple C, Inc. toolboxi and an alfalfa bale donated by Pfrang Farms.

"We were happy to have such a great turnout to the meeting. The city of Corning is always very welcoming and willing to help out in so many ways. With the meeting being open and free to the public, we see many people come in that are interested in the current events affecting local independent producers. Many factors facing agriculture today have a direct effect on rural communities all

across the state, so supporting the independent producer is supporting the rural way of life in Kansas," stated Gary Schreiber, KCA Board Member.

Matt Hutchins of ImmuCell kicked off the meeting with a presentation on calf welfare. Attendees learned which techniques work and which don't with regard to calving and the prevention of scours. According to ImmuCell, there is nearly a 15% death and an additional 20% that recover, but at a significant cost as compared to having never developed scours.

"With a 57% economic loss taking place within the first 24 hours and up to 75% in the first 7 days, it is important to have a scours prevention program in place in your cow/ calf operation. ImmuCell has found a solution which statistically provides immediate immunity with our First Defense products," stated Hutchins.



KCA is actively supporting independent producers in Topeka and Washington, D.C. Staff updated attendees on current legislation, Beef Checkoff, USDA Dietary Guidelines, and Country of Origin Labeling. Numerous members expressed an interest in Senate Bill SB178, and how it would affect their property tax liabilities if it were to become part of the Kansas tax law.

to the Senate Assessment and Taxation Committee when Senate Bill 178 is scheduled for a hearing. We can overcome a drought, late freeze, or a hail storm, but this legislation would pull the rug right out from under the farmer's and rancher's feet, and we just cannot let that happen," stated Tyler Dupy, KCA Executive Director.

The final presentation of the evening, "Is there a firewall between KLA and KBC," was provided by KCA mem-

> bers Jim Dobbins and David Pfrang. The presentation discussed the authority of the Kansas Livestock Association (KLA) over the Kansas Beef Council (KBC). Attendees learned of the option to redirect the 50% share of the \$1 per head assessment which goes to the KBC to the Cattlemen's Beef Board (CBB), which is the national administrator for the Beef Checkoff.

"We fully support a Beef Checkoff. What we guestion is the administration of the dollar that we as

producers are required to pay. Without a clear firewall between KLA and KBC, and a total lack of transparency, how do we know our own dollars aren't used to promote conflicting interests?" asked Jim Dobbins.

The meeting adjourned following the giveaway of door prizes and an auction of donatitems from area businesses.


A Presidential Farewell..



OIL PRICE DROPS BENEFIT RANCHERS IN MORE WAYS THAN ONE...

BUT THE WINDOW IS CLOSING!

The obvious benefit in the recent drop in oil prices is substantially lower fuel cost when we fill up our pickups and tractors. It's also pushing steel pipe prices lower, but time is limited.



Any type of political hiccup or change in attitude in the Middle East can drive oil prices back up overnight; your other concern, time is limited to take advantage of lower steel prices is this: Drops are a *double edged sword*. The oil field is arguably the largest consumer of pipe in our country, as pipe is used both to drill and complete wells. The oil price collapse has most mills that specialize in oil country tubular products either shutting down or have vast excess capacity. Consequently; any time supply exceeds demand, regardless the commodity, prices drop. The odd fact that affects ranchers like us using pipe for our fences and corrals, we rely on these same mills to produce the reject and secondary pipe that we depend on. Therefore, the availability of this pipe is rapidly drying up. Soon, very soon the demand will exceed the supply and pipe prices will rise.

Don't count on used pipe to supply our market, either. Those of you that know me or follow my blogs know that I think using used pipe in corrals and fences is a huge mistake; but that is a whole other subject. However, what we know having experienced this before: oil field operators will re-use their used pipe more, rather than purchasing new in order to save money. This means that by the time that used pipe is released into our market it is totally worn out, used up. I would not use it if it were given to me; but that's just me.

Are you planning on building or expanding your fencing & corrals in the next year? Now is the time to stock up! I honestly feel pipe prices are at the low end of the spectrum. That's what my crystal ball says anyway.

KCA at work in Topeka and Washington, D.C.

The Kansas Cattlemen's Association (KCA) continues to track legislation for KCA members and other independent producers. Upon their return from spring break, state lawmakers will continue their work to balance the state budget and attempt to pass a 2016 and 2017 budget. As appropriations are completed by lawmakers, KCA will be there to review the bills and offer testimony.

The state budget has dominated this legislative session, and agriculture has been among the many sectors targeted to help fill the gaps caused by deep cuts in the state income tax. Senate Bills 261 and 264 propose the elimination of prior tax exempt statuses on residential and agriculture utilities as well as farm machinery and equipment and the service, repair, or replacement parts for farm machinery and equipment. The financial impact of these exemptions would produce an estimated \$223 million in additional state revenues for fiscal year 2016. KCA opposes both SB261 and SB264, and has developed testimony in support of producer interests.

Senate Bill 178 proposes an increase in ag-use land valuations, and threatens a possible 400-700% increase in land value assessments. The bill was previously scheduled for hearing in the Senate Committee on Assessment and Taxation, however was later removed from the hearing schedule. KCA opposes this legislation, and will continue to keep track of its unlikely progress in the 2015 legislative session.


Governor Sam Brownback signed into law, Senate Bill 45 on April 2, 2015 concerning concealed firearms. The bill adds language allowing the concealed carry of a firearm without a concealed carry license issued by the State of Kansas, as long as that individual is not prohibited from possessing a firearm under either federal or state law. The law prohibits anyone under the age of 21 to carry any pistol, revolver, or other concealed firearm except when on the person's land or fixed place of business.

The USDA is accepting nominations to serve on the Cattlemen's Beef Board (CBB). Any beef producer in the United States that owns cattle or any importer who imports cattle or beef can be considered for nomination. All eligible producers and importers are invited to seek nomination by June 5, 2015. Producers and importers must be nominated through a USDA certified producer organization and submit the appropriate paperwork. The KCA is a certified producer organization, and continues to seek nominations that balance the CBB with independent producer perspectives.

Avian flu has been the talk of numerous eastern communities as reports of positive cases have been confirmed. The Kansas Department of Agriculture Animal Health indicates no concern for bird to bovine transmission of the disease, but reminds the public that bird to human transmission is not unfounded in H5N1 & HPAI strains, so use caution. The overall health concern for humans is relatively low as compared to typical influenza.

Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Administrator Gina Mc-Carthy announced the proposed rule previously called "Waters of the US" has now been renamed to "Clean Water Rule." McCarthy has stated that the EPA is working to finalize the proposed rule by the end of the 2015 summer. The Senate Agriculture Committee, chaired by Kansas Senator, Pat Roberts, held a hearing on March 24, 2015, to hear testimony from stakeholders regarding the proposed rule.

"I find it particularly troubling that despite the unanimous outcry from a broad coalition of stakeholders and industries that have voiced concern about the manner and process by which EPA advanced this proposed rule, EPA continues to plunge ahead. Changing the name is not enough. Change the rule," stated Chairman Roberts.



USDA Dietary Guidelines Fail to Provide Balance Every five years, the USDA and the Department of meets the "meat, poultry, and eggs" recommendation.

Every five years, the USDA and the Department of Health and Human Services develop the Dietary Guidelines Advisory Committee (DGAC). They are tasked with the review of scientific and medical knowledge to determine recommendations for the next edition of the Dietary Guidelines for Americans. The current committee recently produced the 2015 guidelines and they have been made available at health.gov. The prominent direction of the guidelines limits the American diet to the consumption of fruits, vegetables, and nuts, and is based primary on that of a "Mediterranean style".

The recommendation of the committee was that a healthy dietary pattern is lower in red meat. The DGAC report indicates that nearly 80% of the US population

meets the "meat, poultry, and eggs" recommendation. Many experts have criticized the new guidelines, citing a total lack of acknowledgment of a lean red meat diet having numerous nutritional benefits.

The Board of Directors of the Kansas Cattlemen's Association is currently developing comments to be submitted to the USDA during the open comment period. Comments are being accepted until May 8, 2015, which was previously extended. Members of the public are encouraged to provide comments.


