The investigation of embezzlement of \$2.6 million, over a seven-year period, by a former Oklahoma Beef Council employee, warrants additional considerations and review of the Beef Checkoff program in its entirety. Regardless of reports released by the Cattlemen's Beef Board of phenomenal support of the Beef Checkoff by cattlemen, dissension grows in the ranks due to a lack of transparency of how the contributions are utilized.

weak USDA oversight, and lack of producer control.

Kansas Cattlemen's Association (KCA) has long called for reform of the Beef Checkoff with respect to transparency, structure, and oversight. The Beef Checkoff has provid-

ed numerous benefits of branding and beef promotion, Beef Quality Assurance, and extensive product development research. KCA supports the worthwhile projects which help to move demand forward for our product, but reminds that it is critical to have control and oversight of these programs to ensure fiscal responsibility and maximum return for the investment.

"When cattle producer contributions are used for anything other than beef promotion, research, and administration, they are used contrary to their purpose. KCA applauds the Oklahoma Beef Council for working to bolster its accounting systems and internal controls, and hiring a third-party accounting firm to add more oversight. We urge all other organizations across the country charged with managing Beef Checkoff contributions to improve

internal controls. In addition, they need to provide detailed accounting to the ranching community of how their hard-earned money is being disbursed," stated Tyler Dupy, KCA Executive Director.

The Kansas Cattlemen's Association is committed to restoring profits, self-es-

teem, freedom, fair trade, trust, and community pride back to the farms, ranches, and rural communities across Kansas and the nation. KCA seeks to ensure Beef Checkoff contributions are used legitimately and efficiently to promote USA Beef as it is: safe, wholesome, nutritious, and delicious protein.

Repeal of the Affordable Care Act has long been a matter of when, not if. Within Trump's first hours as President, he signed an executive order calling for minimal enforcement of economically negative effects of the ACA. Congress has proposed multiple variations to replace Obamacare. We will likely see these debated over the coming months.



Last year we imported more Beef than we exported, most of which was lower quality meat to be part of the grind for ground beef. With weigh-up cows around \$60 cwt, even with a low feed cost of gain, you can't add value to a cull cow by adding pounds. Without the pressure from imported meat products, a higher value received for the cull cow would help offset the cost of the new replacement heifer. The strong dollar is expected to continue, placing additional pressure on exports.





Kansas Finally Represented in Both Agriculture Committees in D.C.

The Senate Republican Conference has chosen Senator Pat Roberts to continue as Chairman for the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry during the 115th Congress. He has previously served as chair of the committee. Roberts intends to work with President Trump to roll-back regulations. Chairman Roberts will also likely have significant influence on the next Farm Bill.

For four years, Kansas has lacked representation on the House Agriculture Committee since the unseating of Representative Tim Huelskamp in 2012. Congressman-Elect, Dr. Roger Marshall, has been selected by House leadership to sit on the committee

during the 115th Congress. The House Ag. Committee oversees jurisdictions of agriculture economics, production, marketing and stabilization of ag. products, animal health and welfare, commodity exchanges, crop insurance, and more. Texas Congressman, Mike Conway, chairs the committee.

Kansas Legislature Session Opens

The 2017 Kansas Legislative session began on January 9, 2017 with another year of tough budget shortfall decisions to make. Governor Sam Brownback addressed the congress, digging in that the 2012 tax breaks are contributing to growth and economic development for the state. Never-the-less, the state still faces a \$350 million shortfall at the end of June, and a deficit over \$800 million for the fiscal year 2018.

With a new congress in session, the sentiment among lawmakers is somewhat different than in past years. Although difficult, many see the opportunity for small changes to make a big difference in the solvency of the state financials. Others do not share the sentiment and agree with shifting funds from highways and tobacco settlements.

Agriculture policy updates have been proposed by the Kansas Department of Agriculture, including: transportation weight limits, water issues, and KDA inspections.

As the legislative session continues to pick up pace, Kansas Cattlemen's Association will continually track bills through both chambers and offer testimony to the relevant committees on behalf of independent cattle producers. eyeing big changes for the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), are also trickling out of his press office. President Trump's approach to trade agreements is bi-lateral, meaning he plans to negotiate directly with individual countries. The thought is that the U.S. loses overall benefit in trade deals when negotiating with multi-natinally.

Agriculture producers must wait an additional 60 days for the implementation of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) planned Farmer Fair Practices Rules. The published interim final rule and two proposed rules are designed to help balance the relationships between producers and meat packers in the concentrated livestock and poultry industries. President Trump signed an executive order postponing these and other proposed rules in order to provide the administration time to review all current proposed regulations. KCA will continue to follow the developments with the proposed regulation, and express to USDA and the Trump administration the importance of these protections.

President Trump has stated strong energy infrastructure is critical to reviving the U.S. economy. He plans to sign executive orders re-initiating the Keystone XL and Dakota Access Pipelines. Although the action does not immediately effect the status of either pipeline, it shows the Trump Administration does not intend to act to prevent their development.


Last week before his inauguration, President-elect Trump nominated former Georgia Governor Sonny Perdue to be his Secretary of Agriculture.


